UPDATE

New EU Code

Since the Canadian Organic Standard is now equivalent to the European standard, the European Union has assigned Ecocert a specific certifiers code: **CA-ORG-006**. This code must be used on the labels of products made with 100% Canadian agricultural ingredients exported to Europe. If you are not directly exporting your products to Europe, this change will not affect your labels. For more information, please contact Ecocert Canada or visit our website at www.ecocertcanada.com.

NOP


The Canada Organic Office has published a letter for buyers confirming that products certified according to the Canadian Organic Standards and the equivalency agreement between Canada and the US don't have to be certified NOP. The COR+ equivalency agreement US-Canada allows you to sell your products in the US as well as to countries who use the NOP without using the USDA logo. During a recent meeting with Mr. McEvoy, NOP agent, it was clearly stated that it is forbidden to issue an NOP certificate in Canada. REGULATORY INFORMATION

Modifications to the Canadian standards: poultry and pork

Changes have been made this summer to standards concerning organic poultry and pork production. Here are the abbreviated modifications:

Livestock Living Conditions	The floor shall not be entirely of slatted or grid construction. Solid flooring is preferred but where nonslip slatted floors exist, the floor design shall ensure that the foot of the smallest animal cannot be caught in a void. Areas between the voids shall be at least the width of the foot of the animals. (6.8.1.h)
Poultry	Surfaces to perch shall be provided for all laying hens at not less than 18 cm/hen. (6.8.11.4)
	Exits shall allow the passage of more than one bird at a time. (6.8.11.5)
	Houses with slatted floors shall have 30% min. of solid floor area with sufficient litter available for dust baths, scratching and foraging. (6.8.11.6)
	Natural light shall be provided indoors for all poultry. (6.8.11.8)
Pork	Farrow to finish operators shall not exceed 2.5 sows/ha. (6.8.13.1)
	Pigs shall have access to outdoor exercise areas. Access to pasture is recommended but not mandatory. (6.8.13.2)
	Sows shall be kept in groups, except in the last stages of pregnancy and during the suckling period. Restraint is allowed for a maximum of 5 days when needed for piglet protection. (6.8.13.3)
	Piglets shall not be kept on flat decks or in piglet cages. (6.8.13.5)
	The use of nose rings is prohibited. (6.8.13.8)

Inputs



It is now possible to use the Input: Approved by Ecocert logo on the labels of agricultural inputs that are registered in the input approval program. An annual inspection is required to be able to use the logo. Please contact Ecocert Canada for more information.

Grain Transaction Certificate

If you require additional guarantee at a sale or purchase of grain, it is possible to obtain a transaction certificate from Ecocert. The approach is simple, you fill in the certificate template (available on request) and then we validate the quantity and certification of the producer. The issuance of this document is \$ 10 and it is optional.
